Principal's report

End of Term

School Review and Self-Evaluation

As I mentioned previously, the College is undertaking its 4 year review this year which culminates in our new 4 year Strategic Plan. The first component of the review is to complete a self-evaluation.

As we did four years ago, we are seeking feedback on three questions about the school:

What should the school **keep** doing? (things we are doing well)

What should the school **stop** doing? (things we don't do well)

What should the school **start** doing? (things that we don't do but could make the school better)

On Wednesday April 6th, Dana Foenander and David Hwang from Northern Grampians Shire visited the school to discuss the future structural plan for St. Arnaud.

The students were asked their opinions, as the Shire is most interested in the views of the people who will inherit the town in the future.

Students were asked to share their views on the kinds of buildings, shops, recreation facilities and amenities they would like to see developed in St. Arnaud.

Dana and David worked very closely with the students on various activities, starting with mapping out where they hang out in town, as well as, places they don't feel safe. To do this they placed green and orange stickers around the map, along with some sticky notes explaining their thoughts and feelings.

Students were also asked to share their opinions verbally and some really interesting and progressive thoughts were put forward, including strong views on the Shire improving LGBTQI+ representation in the town.

The next activity involved the students mapping out their movements around town, such as how they get to school and sport. The Shire is very keen to improve the ease of access to important community hubs in their structural plans for the future.

The final task was a little bit of writing, where students could articulate their own personal view of the town and where they would like to see it develop going forward.

The students were extremely engaged with the activities and the presenters did a fantastic job of explaining the Shire's thinking behind the questions and tasks.



Parent Payment Policy Arrangements in 2022

The Department of Education and Training has sought to clarify the Parent Payments Policy for 2022. Schools can request contributions from parents under three categories;

- Curriculum Contributions contributions for curriculum items and activities which the school deems necessary for students to learn the curriculum (e.g. textbook use, consumable materials, paper)
- Other Contributions Voluntary financial contributions for non-curriculum items and activities that relate to the school's functions and objectives (e.g. school building enhancements)
- Extra-Curricular Items and Activities Items and activities that enhance or broaden the schooling experience of students and are above and beyond what the school provides for free to deliver the Curriculum. These are provided on a user-pays basis. (e.g. Optional Year level camps)

School Council has approved the 2022 Parent Payment Policy and Parent Payment Fees. The fees are located on the school webpage, or please contact the office to have fees sent.

Parent Payment Arrangements and Options:

- · Parents will be provided with early notification of annual payment requests and reasonable notice will be given for any other payment requests during the year (i.e. excursions, camps)
- The College offers Parents the option to make payment by instalments. Please contact Kerrie Swanton, Business Manager, to make these arrangements.
- Methods of payment are BPAY, EFTPOS, cash or cheque.
- Eligible families that receive Camps, Sport & Excursion Funds can allocate these funds for sports travel, camps and excursions only.
- The payment for Optional Items including camps and excursions must be paid by the specified due date prior to departure. Other payments for Optional Items including Food Technology must be paid in week 2 of each Term, or by negotiated instalments.
- When making payment via BPAY, please note the receipt number on the returned permission slip or email paid items to st.arnaud.sc@education.vic.gov.au
- New families to the school who do not have Family BPay details, please contact the school for these details.

Camps, Sports and Excursions Fund applications

The Camps, Sports and Excursions Fund helps eligible families to cover the costs of school trips, camps and sporting activities. Applications for the Camps, Sports and Excursions Fund (CSEF) close If you have a valid means-tested concession card, such as a Veterans Affairs Gold Card, Centrelink Health Care Card or Pensioner Concession Card, or are a temporary foster parent, you may be eligible. Payment amounts this year are \$225 for eligible secondary school students. Payments are made direct to the school to use towards expenses relating to camps, excursions and sporting activities for the benefit of your child.


If you applied for CSEF through our school last year, you do not need to complete an application form this year, unless there has been a change in your family circumstances.

All I can tell you is what I remember, in the words that I have. Hayley tends to her bees and follows the rules in the only world she has ever known.


Until she witnesses the impossible: a drip from the ceiling.

The Australian Signals Directorate (ASD) is the national authority for information security and through its Work Experience Program offers students from Years 11-12 an opportunity to extend their knowledge and skills in science, technology, engineering, and mathematics (STEM), with a focus on information/cyber security. High achieving Year 10 Students with a strong interest in this field are also encouraged to apply and may be considered for a placement. The ASD Work Experience Program offers a number of challenges designed to increase STEM knowledge and understanding, such as:

- python programming
- identifying security intrusions on a computer system
- identifying email compromises
- monitoring network traffic to detect exploits
- conducting forensic examinations of hard drives
- exploiting web application vulnerabilities
- learning modern encryption methods and how they are used to protect data
- performing geospatial analysis and utilising geospatial tools for imagery analysis
- engineering hardware and software solutions for security problems
- · robotics programming using Arduino
- constructing electrical circuits




