Principal's Report

Welcome Back

I would like to welcome everyone back for Term 2 and hope that you were all able to have a relaxing holiday. I would like to take this opportunity to thank all of the students for their participation and effort in last term's House Athletics sports, which was very well led by the Year 12 cohort. I would also like to thank and acknowledge all students for their attendance on the last day of Term 1. We were trialling a slightly earlier finish with activities in the afternoon which appeared to work really well. Thanks to the Year 12's for organising the Easter Egg hunt.

A special welcome back to Year 9 students Adella Burr and Demi Leach, who spent Term 1 at the School for Student Leadership at Gnurad Gundidj. I know they had a great time and look forward to hearing about their adventures over the upcoming weeks.

I would also like to make mention of two students who achieved some significant sporting achievements over the holidays. Firstly, Year 9 student, Duncan Jackson captained the state Under-15 Hockey Team in the National Championships in Bathurst and they ended up taking out third place. Year 10 student, Ben Blake, competed in the National Archery competition in Mudgee and gained several gold and silver medals (in knife and axe throwing as well!) earning him recognition as a National Champion. Well done, Duncan and Ben!

Rural Youth Ambassador

On the second last day of last term we were notified that Year 11 student, Josie Wilson, had been selected to be one of 15 Rural Youth Ambassadors across the state. This is a great achievement and Josie began her work this week with a three day forum in Melbourne. Our College has a strong history with the Rural Youth Ambassador program, which is designed to get the opinions and ideas of country students recognised and heard at the highest levels of State Parliament. In fact, the Rural Youth Ambassadors get significantly better access than any school staff to our politicians. Well done, Josie!

Busy term ahead

We have a busy term ahead of us with the House Cross Country on the afternoon of Monday, 3 May. The Cross Country is a great event in that everyone can participate even if it is to jog/walk the track. This is quickly followed by the National NAPLAN testing for students in Years 7 and 9. Keeping an eye on the big picture, we also have end of semester assessment for all subjects, which include exams for students in Years 9-11. The General Achievement Test (or GAT) is also on for any students completing a Year 12 VCE subject in 2021. It is worth noting that the GAT will be compulsory for all Year 12 students within a couple of years. To round the term out, we will commence Semester 2 studies in the last two weeks of this term.

Sports Uniform – PE classes

As mentioned last term, students in Years 7 to 10, and students in Years 11 and 12 undertaking PE classes are now required to be in the green sports top. If students do not have one, we will provide one in the short term each class. There is a good supply of the sports shirts at Ramjac.

L2P Mentor training

On the last Friday of the holidays five staff (Mr. Marland, Mr. Lobley, Miss. Bertalli, Mrs. Reynolds and Dr. Taylor) joined me in completing the L2P Mentor training. The L2P program enables people aged between 16 to their early 20's an ongoing opportunity to access both a car and volunteer supervisor or mentor to help gain their 120 hours of learner driving. The program also gives these people access to free driving lessons with a qualified instructor at regular intervals or when needed. This is a great opportunity for our students and I thank those staff who were willing to put their hands up; we were told that we are the only school in the state that has had staff train as a whole group.

General Behaviour around the school

Unfortunately, we have noticed some low level poor behaviour amongst our students this term, particularly amongst the boys who are kicking the footy on the oval. We have provided goal posts (that the students asked for) and have asked students to stay away from the far sides of the oval due to ongoing issues with neighbours. Some of our students are encouraging and leading others to do the wrong thing and then be rude and belligerent to staff who ask them to do the right thing. As an immediate consequence, football was banned on Wednesday to Friday to try and send a clear message to the students. We are hoping that we can start next week afresh and hope that you will re-enforce this message with your child at home.

This Sunday is ANZAC Day and our College Captains will be presenting at the St. Arnaud ANZAC Day Memorial service. The service will begin at 10:30am with wreath laying at the Cenotaph near the Town Hall before moving to the RSL Hall for the formal service.

Ben Blake competed in the Australian Junior Archery Titles held in Mudgee NSW on the


2 nd April through to the 5 th April 2021.

2022 YEAR 12 PROGRAM

The National Youth Science Forum (NYSF) Year 12 program is a 12-day program designed to provide students with a broader understanding of the diverse study and career options available in science, technology, engineering and mathematics (STEM) and to encourage continued study in these fields.

In 2022, the NYSF will deliver a 12-day program from 10-25 January via a combination of in-person and digital STEM experiences. 2022 participants will experience everything the NYSF is famous for. including keynote speakers, lectures, hands-on workshops, debates, expos and enriching social activities. In-person STEM visit days and events will be held over a week of the program at major city hubs across the country, enabling students to meet each other and network with like-minded peers. A continuous program of digital events will run alongside the in-person events meaning the program is accessible to all. This option also means the NYSF experience is still accessible and stimulating should there be a COVID-19 hotspot emerge or lockdown called at a hub location.

To apply for the NYSF Year 12 Program, students must meet the following criteria:

- Current Year 11 student (2021)
- · Australian citizen or resident, and/or studying full-time in an Australian high school
- Desire to pursue further study and a career in science, engineering, technology, or a STEM related discipline.

JOB PROFILE FORESTER



Foresters study, establish, manage and harvest forests to ensure there is a continuing supply of timber and associated forest products. They also maintain forests to meet community recreational needs. They may be involved with forest ecology (environment), hydrology (water), entomology (insects), pathology (diseases) or geographic information

Duties & Tasks

- Manage forest resources by protecting and regenerating forests and promoting effective growth
- Establish plantations of native and introduced timber species
- Plan and implement fire prevention, detection and suppression systems
- Observe the effects of environmental factors on the growth and health of plants
- Measure and record tree volume and growth, as well as changes in the forest's timber and other resources
- Estimate the sustainable supply of timber and associated forest products
- Plan and implement the growing and harvesting of native and introduced plantation forests
- Protect wildlife habitats and forest streams
- Develop recreational facilities and control their use
- Undertake landscape management, which may involve manual and satellite mapping, aerial photo interpretation and field measurements
- Advise governments, industry and landholders on forestry, and plan and conduct educational programs on the care and value of trees and forests
- Conduct research on various aspects of forestry
- Supervise and train technical, clerical and field staff and coordinate their work
- Prepares plans for reforestation and devises efficient harvesting systems.
- Investigates, plans and implements management procedures to cope with the effects of fires, floods, droughts, soil erosion, insect pests and diseases,
- Studies the propagation and culture of forest trees, methods for improving the growth of stock, and the effects of thinning on forest yields.
- Manages forest resources to maximise their long-term commercial, recreational and environmental benefits for the community.

VET in the VCE or VCAL

VCE VET programs

VCE VET programs are VET qualifications approved by the VCAA to contribute to your VCE or VCAL.

There are currently 26 VCE VET programs that create pathways to a diverse range of industries, including health, engineering, science, IT, construction and the creative industries.

Credit towards the VCE or VCAL

All VCE VET programs contribute to the VCE in the same way as a VCE study.

VET programs contribute to the VCAL through meeting the requirements of the Industry Specific Skills or Work Related Skills strands.

Study scores and ATARs

Some VCE VET programs are scored and some are non-scored.

All VCE VET programs with a Units 3 and 4 sequence can be included in the calculation of your ATAR.

Other VET qualifications

If you choose to do a VET qualification that is not from a VCE VET program, you may be eligible for credit towards your VCE or VCAL. This is called block credit recognition.

School-based apprenticeship or traineeship

You can commence an apprenticeship or traineeship while you are at school and receive credit towards your VCE or VCAL. Apprenticeships and traineeships give you the opportunity to combine your VET qualification with part-time employment.

Structured workplace learning

If you are doing a VCE VET program, structured workplace learning gives you the opportunity to get on-the-job training where you can master the skills and knowledge of your qualification.

Top five differences between a VCE VET program and a VCE study or a VCAL unit.



1. An extra qualification

You can gain a nationally recognised VET qualification while undertaking your VCE or VCAL.



2. Connected to the workplace

VET qualifications give you industry exposure and experience in the workplace that reinforces your skills development.



3. Practical

VET can strengthen your education by giving you the opportunity to gain practical skills and knowledge that complement your VCE studies.



4. Units of competency

Units of competency are the building blocks that make up a VET qualification. Each unit of competency includes specific skills and knowledge.



Competency based assessment

VET students are assessed as 'competent' or 'not yet competent' in each unit of competency. To be assessed as competent, you must show a consistent application of skills and knowledge to the standard required in the workplace.

NAPLAN



Students in Year 7 and Year 9 will be sitting the National Assessment Program (NAPLAN) – Literacy and Numeracy tests during the <u>week beginning 10th May</u>. Please encourage your children to do their very best, as always, on this program. Language Conventions and Writing tests will be held on Tuesday 11th May, Reading on Wednesday 12th May and Numeracy on Thursday 13th May. Please ensure your child attends school during this time. Students who miss any tests will be expected to catch up on Friday 14th May or in the afternoon session of Tuesday, Wednesday or Thursday.
