Principal's Report

NAPLAN

This week our Year 7 and 9 students undertook the National Assessment Program – Literacy and Numeracy (or NAPLAN) testing. This testing is conducted across all of Australia and allows for comparisons and identification of areas that need further focus. We spoke to our students at the beginning of the week with the very clear message to just give it a go and do their best. The testing does allow students to track their progress which we have encouraged them to do. Have they been able to make two years progress since their last testing? As a College, this is our major focus – the student growth data – not so much the end point that is achieved. I am happy to report that our participation rate was very high and it appeared that all of our students followed the advice to give it their best shot. We now wait until the results are released later in the year.

Year 11 Fit to Drive

On Wednesday our Year 11 students attended a presentation at the College called 'Fit to Drive'. This program is aimed at our newest or soon-to-be road users, making sure that they are aware of the dangers of being on the road and the importance of looking out for your friends and mates. The dangers of peer pressure are clearly discussed and hopefully some of the messages got through to our young learner drivers. This session clearly reinforced the very strong and emotional message that was delivered last Friday with the **John Maher Presentation of 'Carmen's Story'.** Again, I strongly encourage all parents of students in Years 9 to 12 to take the opportunity to sit down and discuss last week's presentation with your child if you have not been able to do so already.

NCD Cross Country

Today we are hosting the North Central Division Cross Country at Lord Nelson Park. Students from Birchip, Boort, Charlton, Donald, East Loddon, Maryborough, Pyramid Hill and Wedderburn all came to St. Arnaud to compete on our great course. A great deal of planning goes into such events and it is great to have our VCAL, Hands On Learning and MYLNS students going down to help with the organisation and smooth running of the event.

Student Uniform and the onset of winter

Just a reminder to all families and students particularly with the onset of the colder weather, that the College uniform has a range of options including a Rugby Jumper and Soft Shell Jacket. There has been an increasing incidence of students turning up to school in either the wrong jackets, jumper or hoodies. If this is the case, students will be asked to remove their outerwear and a replacement jumper provided for them for the day. Year 9 Science Electricity Unit

As part of the Year 9 Science curriculum the students studied electricity. During this unit, the students in small groups or individually had to design and create an electronic game that used parallel or series circuits and incorporated lights and buzzers.

Year 12 Food Studies

Sticky chicken wings

By **boiling** before **baking**, the chicken wings are partially cocked by moist heat. This starts the process of denaturation, and the next step of marinading continues to denature some of the proteins in the chicken wings so they become more tender and flavours develop. The final step of baking completes the coaking process – the **Maillard reaction** and **coramelisation** result in a dark brown colour and a delicious complex flavour profile in the chicken wings. The chicken wings provide a good source of protein; however, the honey and say sauce add sugar and salt to the diet.

4 chicken wings

MARINADE

1 clove garlic, crushed

2 cm fresh ginger, peeled and grated or finely diced

1/4 teaspoon ground coriander

pinch of cirramon

¼ teaspoon smoked paprika

34 teaspoon dried chilli flakes

i tablespoon honey.

1 tablespoon say sauce

1 tablespoon vegetable oil

1/2 lemon, juiced

pinch of salt

1 tablespoon cariander, chapped

1 tablespoon mint, chapped

METHOD

- Remove the tips from the chicken wings then out them in half at the joint.
- 2 Fill a large saucepan with salted water and bring to the boil. Add the chicken wings and simmer for 10 minutes. Drain and lay the wings out on paper towel and put dry.
- 3 Combine the marinade ingredients in a large bowl. Add the chicken wings and toss them through the marinade and leave to rest at room temperature for 30 minutes.
- 4 Preheat the over to 200 °C and line a baking tray that has an edge on all sides with baking paper.
- 5 Remove the chicken wings from the marinade and place on the tray in single layer. Place in the oven to bake for 10 minutes – turn after 5 minutes. The wings will caramelise and may char on the edges. The juices of the chicken should be clear.
- 6 Pour the marinade into a small saucepan and bring to the boil. Reduce the heat to simmer until the marinade starts to thicken. Brush over the cooked chicken wings.
- 7 Sprinkle with chopped coriander and fresh mint.

JOB PROFILE INTELLIGENCE ANALYST



Intelligence analysts evaluate information from a variety of classified and unclassified sources. This information is often incomplete, contradictory and can vary widely in terms of reliability. Depending on their background and qualifications, an intelligence analyst may examine a diverse set of countries, issues (such as terrorism) and cultures. Intelligence analysts working for the Department of Defence specialise in a number of areas depending on their training, qualifications and agency employment.

Duties & Tasks

- Collect and analyse various sources of intelligence to determine trends and make assessments
- Prepare intelligence reports and briefs to inform senior government officials
- Translate foreign language material
- Communicate and cooperate closely with both military and civilian organisations.
- Reviewing existing policies and legislation to identify anomalies and out-of-date provisions.
- Ascertaining the accuracy of data collected and reliability of sources.
- Compiling and disseminating intelligence information using briefings, maps, charts, reports and other methods.
- Formulating and analysing policy options, preparing briefing papers and recommendations for policy changes, and advising on preferred options.
- Determining organisational and client intelligence requirements.
- Conducting threat and risk assessments and developing responses.
- Organising, collecting, collating and analysing data, and developing intelligence information such as electronic surveillance.
- Assessing impacts, financial implications, interactions with other programs and political and administrative feasibility of policies.
- Liaising and consulting with program administrators and other interested parties to identify policy needs.
- Researching social, economic and industrial trends, and client expectations of programs and services provided.


• COVID Vaccine Update •

If you feel you are eligible to receive the CSEF payment and have not made a claim yet, please contact the college office and we will happily assist you.

PARENT / GUARDIAN INFORMATION AND CONSENT LETTER 2021 Student Attitudes to School Survey

Dear Parent / Guardian,

This letter is to inform you about the 2021 Student Attitudes to School Survey (AtoSS), that your child is invited to participate in.

About the survey

We value student voice as a means to improving student engagement, wellbeing and quality instruction and are conducting a survey to find out what your child thinks of your school.

The AtoSS is an annual student survey offered by the Department of Education and Training to assist your child's school to gain an understanding of students' perceptions and experience of school. Students will be asked about their thoughts and feelings in relation to their school, their learning, peer relationships, bullying and life in general.

There are also some questions about student health and wellbeing. Understanding health and wellbeing needs is important to support students to learn and thrive at school. The Department is providing this addition to the core survey to allow your child's school to capture this information to support students.

Students will be asked about resilience, family relationships, community connections, health (including mental health), access to health services and physical activity.

This year, the AtoSS will be conducted at your school over the period Monday 24th of May – Friday 4th June³.

What are the benefits?

In our experience, young people enjoy having their say. We have been running this survey for nearly 20 years and it has been invaluable in helping schools understand student views. Your school will use the survey results to plan programs and activities to improve your child's schooling experience.

What are the risks?

While we do not anticipate many risks of participation, some students may find some of the survey questions too personal and sensitive in nature. Should you agree for your child to participate, they are still free to skip questions or to withdraw at any stage if the survey makes them upset or uncomfortable.

The survey been approved by a Human Research Ethics Committee. The questions are selected from validated survey instruments, are strength-based, and tailored for each year level group.

What will my child be asked to do?

Your child will be invited to complete the survey online during class time using a purpose built secure online survey tool. It is important to note that we are not in any way "testing" your child. Please note:

- Student participation in the survey is voluntary and students may withdraw at any time.
- The survey will take around 20-45 minutes to complete.

How is my child's confidentiality protected?

Your child will be provided with a unique login to complete the survey from their teacher. The student login is an assigned identifier that may be used to link data for statistical and research purposes only.





Personally identifiable data will not be recorded in the survey response file. This ensures that the confidentiality of your child's responses is protected at all times.

How will results be reported?

The survey results will be reported back to the school in an aggregate form throughout the survey period. All survey data that is made available in reports are for groups of students only so that no individual student can be identified. Data suppression rules are used for schools with low student numbers per year level.

Your school may share the results of the survey with parents, in documents such as the School Annual Report.

Options for participation

Participation in this survey is **voluntary**. If you **do not** wish for your child to do the survey, please opt out via email to your school: st.arnaud.sc@education.vic.gov.au. Please do so before Wednesday 19th May stating that you wish to opt out of your child's participation, along with their name and year level.

If your school does not receive a Refusal of Consent email from yourself before the survey commencement date mentioned within this letter, it means that you give your consent for your child to participate in the 2021 Attitudes to School Survey.

A copy of the survey that we are asking your child to complete is available from your child's school. Please contact the administration office if you would like to see the survey before making your decision about whether you would like your child to participate.

2021 Practice GATs

With the compulsory VCE General Achievement Test (GAT) coming up fast on Wednesday 9 June, St. Arnaud Secondary College will be offering practice GAT sessions over the coming weeks.

The GAT is compulsory for any student undertaking a Year 12 level subject and is used in the calculation of their final subject study scores and ATAR.

The GAT is a 3-hour exam that consists of a one hour writing component (with two parts) and a two-hour multiple-choice section.

The GAT tests skills, thinking and knowledge across three domains: Written Communication; Arts, Humanities and Social Sciences; and Maths, Science and Technology.

Whilst students cannot study for the GAT content, knowledge of the structure of the exam, practice responding to the types of questions it contains and experience writing under timed conditions, can help students to maximise their performance on this important assessment.

Therefore, the College will be providing practice GAT sessions on Sunday mornings, starting at 8:30 am.

The written component of the GAT will be professionally assessed by an external and experienced VCE assessor.

An information session about the GAT will be held at the school on Wednesday 19 May during periods 5 & 6 (1:25 pm – 3:05 pm). All VCE students undertaking a year 12 subject will be required to attend. Parents of these students are also invited and welcome to attend.
