# **Picnic at Hanging Rock**

## Students and teacher go missing!

Wouldn't that be a headline for the newsletter! A headline for a national tabloid! An international scandal! Thankfully, history (or fiction) did not repeat itself on the St. Arnaud Secondary College Literature excursion to Hanging Rock.

On Tuesday 23<sup>rd</sup> February, the year 12 Literature class, accompanied by Mrs. Bouchier and Dr. Taylor, left St. Arnaud early for a picnic at Hanging Rock. This year the class is studying Joan Lindsay's 1967 novel, *Picnic at Hanging Rock*, comparing it to Peter Weir's 1975 film of the same name. Unlike the novel and film, it was a cool day with ideal weather for climbing this unique volcanic rock formation.

Upon arrival, the group immediately began their ascent of the rock, well aware of the mystery surrounding the disappearance of three girls and their teacher on Valentine's Day, 1900. All on the excursion had their assigned characters, though the roles of Marion and Irma somehow changed somewhere along the way. *Mysterious!* 

The students' assignment for the day was to photograph landmarks or locations that they could match to passages from the novel. Upon their *presumed* return to school, they would then justify their photographic choices using evidence from the text to explain their adaptation of the written story. The group also sought to identify locations used in Peter Weir's film and was lucky enough to identify some possible places.

At the top of the rock, the students and teachers wove in and around the many pinnacles, squeezing though natural tunnels and hallways. A sure foot was also needed to avoid slipping on the well-worn paths. Some students even danced in a natural amphitheatre area. Push ups were done on a rock formation. The group also sighed with pleasure at the sight of a koala tightly hugging her rather large joey in the cool mid-morning air. The confusing maze of rock formations certainly reflected the distorted writing in certain sections of the novel, giving the students a deeper appreciation of Lindsay's writing style. After a productive two hours 718-metres above sea-level, the group returned to the picnic grounds for a civilised luncheon. Drawing on the novel and time period, chicken pie, tea sandwiches, angel cakes, 'tepid' bananas and a heart-shaped cake were on the menu, washed down with coffee (in lieu of tea). Lunch was followed by some languid relaxation and discussion, ample reward for the busy morning of 'tomboy foolishness' on the rock.

The party returned to school at the scheduled time without any students or teachers missing.

After completing assessment on Lindsay's novel, the Literature class will next study Jane Austen's *Northanger Abbey*. Whilst another excursion would be exciting, it is unlikely a trip to England would be feasible in the current circumstances.









Aged care workers provide care, supervision and support for aged people in residential establishments, clinics, hospitals and private residence. They assist with the maintenance of personal care, domestic duties and management of illness. They also provide companionship and emotional support, and promote independence and community participation.

#### **Duties & Tasks**

- · Assist people with self-medication
- Implement care programs for those in residential establishments
- Provide in-home support with health issues and daily living tasks such as washing, dressing, eating, transport and budgeting
- Assist with the delivery of activities to enhance the physical, social, emotional and intellectual development of those in their care
- Ensure those in their care are washed, dressed, fed and ready for educational and recreational activities
- Assist during domestic activities such as eating meals and showering
- Provide companionship and support during daily activities
- Cook and serve meals, clean premises, wash, iron and perform other household tasks
- Organise refuge accommodation
- Implement appropriate strategies for managing problems related to dementia
- Work with a team of health professionals, family, friends and carers to implement a support program.
- · Assisting in personal hygiene and dressing.
- Providing companionship, friendship and emotional support.
- Accompanying aged and disabled persons during daily activities.
- Performing housekeeping tasks such as vacuuming and cleaning.
- May live in with the person.
- Assisting clients with their mobility.
- Arranging social activities.
- Preparing food for clients.
- May do shopping and run errands.

# MICRO MATHEMATICIANS

Year 7/8 Virtual After School Extension Program

#### ABOUT

Micro Mathematicians is a free after school extension program aimed at students who love maths. Students will get to explore mathematical problems at a deep level following the inquiry process.

The program will run using a virtual environment (Zoom and Google Classroom) and students will have 1 hour each week with the University of Melbourne, School of Mathematics and Statistics Outreach Team. Students will be given additional activities to complete in their own time.

#### WHAT WILL STUDENTS BE DOING?

Students will take part in a variety of activities designed to promote mathematical investigation at a high level. Some of the key mathematical areas we will focus on include, but are not limited to; Number Theory, Data Analysis, Combinatorics, Geometry & Topology and Mathematical Biology. Activities include:

- Problem solving: engaging with challenging problems through various approaches like modelling, collaborative discussion, construction, proof, and arts and crafts. Activities are open ended to allow students to extend the activity as far as they like and in any direction they choose.
- Extended Research Project: working on an extended project across
  two weeks. Students can choose between a range of provided problems.
  Problems are broad and students will need to decide how to narrow
  the problem down, in what direction they wish to take the problem,
  what information they will need to answer the problem and what is
  a suitable approach.
- Research Presentations: Students will be required to present their mathematical research to each other, focusing on the methods they used, the results they concluded, and the questions that still remain open.
- Debate: Engage in mathematical discussions. Students will take part in group debates where they will argue difficult topics within the field of mathematics.



## FINANCIAL ASSISTANCE

#### INFORMATION FOR PARENTS

Every Victorian child should have access to the world of learning opportunities that exist beyond the classroom. The Camps, Sports and Excursions Fund helps ensure that no student will miss out on the opportunity to join their classmates for important, educational and fun activities. It is part of making Victoria the Education State and the Government's commitment to breaking the link between a student's background and their outcomes.

# CAMPS, SPORTS & EXCURSIONS FUND (CSEF)

School camps provide children with inspiring experiences in the great outdoors. Excursions encourage a deeper understanding of how the world works while sports teach teamwork, discipline and leadership. All are a part of a healthy curriculum.

CSEF is provided by the Victorian Government to assist eligible families to cover the costs of school trips, camps and sporting activities.

If you hold a valid means-tested concession card or are a temporary foster parent, you may be eligible for CSEF. A special consideration category also exists for asylum seeker and refugee families. The allowance is paid to the school to use towards expenses relating to camps, excursions or sporting activities for the benefit of your child.

The annual CSEF amount per student is:

- \$125 for primary school students
- \$225 for secondary school students

#### HOW TO APPLY

New applicants should contact the school office to obtain a CSEF application form or download from the website below.

If you applied for CSEF at your child's school last year, you do not need to complete an application form this year unless there has been a change in your family circumstances.

You only need to complete an application form if any of the following changes have occurred:

- **new student enrolments**; your child has started or changed schools this year.
- changed family circumstances; such as a change of custody, change of name, concession card number, or new siblings commencing this year.

Check with the school office if you are unsure.
