# Year 7 (and new families) Welcome BBQ

Now that some COVID restrictions have been lifted, we are planning to run our Year 7 (and new families) Welcome BBQ on Wednesday 9 March. This is a very informal evening for new families to meet the staff and learn a little more about our College and vice versa. We will offer some time to show families through the Compass program, which is our main avenue of communication between school and home. The College will provide the BBQ and (non-alcoholic) drinks on the night, which should run from 6 till about 7pm.

# Vaping

Unfortunately we have noticed or been hearing that there has been an increase in the number of students who are using or bringing Vapes to school. There is a great deal of research into the use of Vapes which **put nicotine into the body**. Nicotine is highly addictive and can: slow brain development in teens and affect memory, concentration, learning, self-control, attention, and mood. In addition, vaping can increase the risk of other types of addiction later in life. Students caught with Vapes at school will have them confiscated and will be suspended.

## **Mobile Phones**

Just a reminder for all students and families that the State Government has banned mobile phones in schools during the day. As a school we are aware that some students may need access to phone immediately before or after school so offer to lock them away during the day. If students are caught with phones at school they will be confiscated and parents notified. If this occurs more than once, the phone will need to be collected by a parent or will be locked away.

I will be taking a week of Long Service Leave next week and will be back at school on Monday 7 March. Vanessa McCormick will be the Acting Principal in my absence.

#### Parent Payment Arrangements and Options:

- Parents will be provided with early notification of annual payment requests and reasonable notice will be given for any other payment requests during the year (i.e. excursions, camps)
- The College offers Parents the option to make payment by instalments. Please contact Kerrie Swanton, Business Manager, to make these arrangements.
- Methods of payment are BPAY, EFTPOS, cash or cheque.
- Eligible families that receive Camps, Sport & Excursion Funds can allocate these funds for sports travel, camps and excursions only.
- The payment for Optional Items including camps and excursions must be paid by the specified due date
  prior to departure. Other payments for Optional Items including Food Technology must be paid in week
  2 of each Term, or by negotiated instalments.

# FINANCIAL ASSISTANCE INFORMATION FOR PARENTS

Every Victorian child should have access to the world of learning opportunities that exist beyond the classroom. The Camps, Sports and Excursions Fund helps ensure that no student will miss out on the opportunity to join their classmates for important, educational and fun activities. It is part of making Victoria the Education State and the Government's commitment to breaking the link between a student's background and their outcomes.

# CAMPS, SPORTS & EXCURSIONS FUND (CSEF)

School camps provide children with inspiring experiences in the great outdoors. Excursions encourage a deeper understanding of how the world works while sports teach teamwork, discipline and leadership. All are a part of a healthy curriculum.

CSEF is provided by the Victorian Government to assist eligible families to cover the costs of school trips, camps and sporting activities.

If you hold a valid means-tested concession card or are a temporary foster parent, you may be eligible for CSEF. A special consideration category also exists for asylum seeker and refugee families. The allowance is paid to the school to use towards expenses relating to camps, excursions or sporting activities for the benefit of your child.

The annual CSEF amount per student is:

- \$125 for primary school students
- · \$225 for secondary school students

#### HOW TO APPLY

New applicants should contact the school office to obtain a CSEF application form or download from the website below.

If you applied for CSEF at your child's school last year, you do not need to complete an application form this year unless there has been a change in your family circumstances.

You only need to complete an application form if any of the following changes have occurred:

- new student enrolments; your child has started or changed schools this year.
- changed family circumstances; such as a change of custody, change of name, concession card number, or new siblings commencing this year.

Check with the school office if you are unsure.


# The republic of Birds By Jessica Miller

# JOB PROFILE ARCHITECT

Architects use creativity and a practical understanding of structures and materials to develop concepts, plans, specifications and detailed drawings for buildings and other structures. They negotiate with builders and planning authorities, administer building contracts, and inspect work that has been carried out.

#### **Duties & Tasks**

- Meet with clients or builders to discuss their requirements and prepare a design brief
- Prepare sketches, production drawings and detailed drawings by hand or using computeraided design (CAD) software
- Combine structural, mechanical, and artistic elements into a building's design, such as decks and atriums, lifts, air conditioning systems and decorative finishes
- Discuss designs and cost estimates with clients and others involved in the project
- Obtain necessary approvals from authorities
- Prepare specifications and contract documents for builders, tradespeople, and legal advisers
- Evaluate projects once they are completed and occupied.
- Writes specifications and contract documents for use by builders and calls tenders on behalf of clients
- Obtains advice from clients and management to determine type, style and size of planned buildings and alterations to existing buildings.
- Inspects construction work in progress to ensure compliance with plans, specifications, and quality standards.
- Provides information regarding designs, materials, and estimated building times.
- Prepares project documentation, including sketches and scale drawings, and integrates structural, mechanical, and aesthetic elements in final designs.

It will be located at the old bowling green site across the road from the Information Centre.


