# Principal's report

### **COVID** cases

We are still experiencing some members of the College Community who are testing positive to COVID. This is a fact that we will be living with for some time, and it is important that we are all aware of the changes to isolation requirements. If you test positive, you need to report this to the school and the DHS site and isolate for 7 days. If you are a household contact, you no longer need to isolate and can attend school or work, etc, but should test for at least 5 of the seven days – and wear masks when you are outside of the home. This is a major and welcomed change.

It is still recommended that all students and staff test twice a week, and the school has a large supply of RAT tests if families are running low.

Outside of this, if you are feeling or showing any symptoms, you should test.

### **CUST Training**

Last week, our staff joined with the Primary School staff to attend our first of two Community Understanding and Safety Training sessions. Delivered by Koorie Education Support Officers with the assistance of Uncle Ron and Uncle Daryl. CUST training is aimed at raising awareness and understanding of our Country's full and rich history and how we all fit into that picture today, and what we as educators can do to help raise our community's understandings. It was an informative session, and we look forward to our second session hopefully next week.

### **NAPLAN**

Just a reminder for students and parents of Year 7 and 9 that NAPLAN testing will be conducted next week. NAPLAN, or the National Assessment Program - Literacy and Numeracy is conducted in Years 3, 5, 7 and 9 every year and is used to measure student achievement and growth nationally and locally, to identify areas to focus on. I encourage all students to undertake the testing – it is good practice and allows students to monitor their own academic progression. It is also used to identify students who may require additional support which can attract funding if needed.

### The Man Cave

Parents of boys in Year 9 and 10 may have noticed something different last Friday evening. These boys participated in a day long personal development session run by a company called The Man Cave. This is a program that aims to get boys in tune and engaged with themselves and others — with the main themes of "Checking In" and "Shout Out". The active participation of our students was very encouraging, and it was very clear that it had an impact on all attendees. The Man Cave presenters will be back in Term 4 to Check In. I encourage all parents and people who know boys in Year 9 and 10 to ask them about their experience.

### **Pirate Day**

Next Friday – May 13, the SRC are holding a Pirate Day to raise money for Brain Cancer research. This is a charity that the students have chosen in respect for Miss Stephanie Carswell, who was appointed to the College at the start of the year before succumbing to brain cancer on March 1 this year. We are very honoured that Margaret and Garry Carswell are aiming to attend the College on this day, and we look forward to all our students getting into the spirit of the day, prior to the Cross Country. We will be holding a special assembly at 1:20 on Friday for a brief presentation and acknowledgement of the day.

### **Students attend Court**

During the last week of Term 1, the Year 11 and 12 Legal Studies students travelled to Horsham to attend a 'Law Talk' session conducted by Judge Chettle from the Victorian County Court. The 'Law Talks' are organised by the Victorian Law Institute in collaboration with several Judges within Victoria's legal system.

Judge Chettle spoke to the students briefly about his career in law and the general workings of the County Court, before answering several questions put to him by the students. He had been a barrister for 26 years before becoming a judge and had spent 20 years as a judge before retiring. Judge Chettle had been coaxed out of retirement as our legal system struggled to cope with COVID restrictions, hence his appearance in Horsham's County Court.

He spoke about his role, likening it to an umpire on a sports field, making sure all the procedures and rules were followed for a fair and just trial to be held. He also spoke about the role of the jury and their responsibilities within a trial, particularly as it is their job to decide guilt or innocence. In answering one of our questions, he noted that in all his time as a judge, he could count on one hand the times he thought the person was not guilty and the jury gave a guilty verdict. One of those times was just in the last few weeks. He explained that once the jury had given a guilty verdict, he had to give a sanction of 11 years imprisonment, even though he thought the person could have been found not guilty.

When asked about any notorious cases that he had presided over, he mentioned Carl Williams, the Melbourne gangster made famous by the 'Underbelly' television series. Of course, the students were too young to remember Carl Williams or to have watched the TV series. Judge Chettle was the judge in the trial related to Carl Williams' murder.

After speaking to the students, Judge Chettle invited us to stay and watch part of the trial sitting before him, so the students were able to see a working court in action. As the court opened, Defence Counsel objected to our presence in the court room as he felt our group could sway or influence the jury. The case we were watching involved the grooming and assault of a schoolgirl and with the students sitting in their uniform in court, the Defence Counsel argued this may be an unfair bias. The Judge dismissed this. The Defence Counsel then argued that the material within the case was inappropriate to the students. The Judge had already told us that evidence that could be deemed inappropriate had already been presented in court and that we would not be subjected to anything untoward. As such, Judge Chettle dismissed the Defence Counsel's view, saying that it was a public and open court, and anyone could attend.

As we were allowed to stay, the students watched the Police Informant give evidence from the witness box. The Prosecutor presented some emails between the victim and the accused to the court and asked the Police Informant some questions about them. The Defence Counsel then had his opportunity to cross examine the Police Informant about emails and other telecommunications between the victim and the accused. Although not the most riveting of evidence, it was interesting to see how the Defence Counsel tried to use the same evidence used by the Prosecutor to cast doubt in the jury's minds. In a criminal trial, the accused is innocent until proven guilty beyond all reasonable doubt. After around an hour and a half, Judge Chettle allowed the jury to have a lunch break and the court was adjourned. The Judge spoke to the legal representatives about the evidence just presented, and basically told everyone the point had been made and to get on with it. He came and spoke to the students again, particularly about what they had just see happen and what he thought would happen next. He invited us back to the afternoon session.

Although we were eager to watch more, we had enough time to have lunch and head back to St. Arnaud before the end of the school day.

### **Man Cave**



Last Friday, the Year 9 & 10 Boys participated in a program called The Man Cave. The program's ideology is about:

Right now, there is not a clear Rite of Passage for boys into manhood. Because of this, boys often initiate themselves into manhood, which usually results in risk-taking behaviour to prove their masculinity (e.g., binge drinking, objectifying women, or train surfing).

The purpose of the program is to fill this gap. To provide boys with a safe, healthy, and contained Rite of Passage into manhood. The programs are designed to be transformational, and to support the psychological and emotional development of a boy, so he can become a healthy young man. This is how the facilitators are trying redefining the journey to manhood.

### Workshop 1 - Realising my Potential

Boys create their own unique version of healthy masculinity by understanding how gender norms have shaped their perspectives to this point, before being given the choice to grow beyond that. Exploration of personal identity, their unique strengths, how to care for themselves and what their values are, all add up to them understanding how they can reach their full potential. In the full-day workshop, boys will:

- Learn how gender stereotypes impact their attitudes and behaviour
- Meet our diverse male and non-binary facilitators
- Learn to constructively express their thoughts and feelings
- Connect to their values and strengths
- Define a values-based vision for the man they want to become
- Leave with tools and resources to support their personal wellbeing

From the feedback from the students, staff and presenters, everyone had a great day and shared many thoughts and feelings. The Year 9 & 10 boys will be having another workshop later in the year.

## Parent Payment Policy Arrangements in 2022

The Department of Education and Training has sought to clarify the Parent Payments Policy for 2022. Schools can request contributions from parents under three categories:

- Curriculum Contributions contributions for curriculum items and activities which the school deems necessary for students to learn the Curriculum e.g., textbook use, consumable materials, paper
- Other Contributions Voluntary financial contributions for non-curriculum items and activities that relate to the school's functions and objectives e.g., school building enhancements
- Extra-Curricular Items and Activities Items and activities that enhance or broaden the schooling experience of students and are above and beyond what the school provides for free to deliver the Curriculum. These are provided on a user-pays basis. e.g., Optional Year level camps

### Parent Payment Arrangements and Options:

- Parents will be provided with early notification of annual payment requests and reasonable notice will be given for any other payment requests during the year (i.e., excursions, camps)
- The College offers Parents the option to make payment by instalments. Please contact Kerrie Swanton, Business Manager, to make these arrangements.
- Methods of payment are BPAY, EFTPOS, cash, or cheque.
- Eligible families that receive Camps, Sport & Excursion Funds can allocate these funds for sports travel, camps, and excursions only.
- The payment for Optional Items including camps and excursions must be paid by the specified due date prior to departure. Other payments for Optional Items including Food Technology must be paid in week 2 of each Term, or by negotiated instalments.
- When making payment via BPAY please note the receipt number on the returned permission slip or email paid items to <u>st.arnaud.sc@education.vic.gov.au</u>
- New families to the school who do not have Family BPay details, please contact the school for these details.

### Camps, Sports, and Excursions Fund applications

The Camps, Sports and Excursions Fund helps eligible families to cover the costs of school trips, camps, and sporting activities. Applications for the Camps, Sports, and Excursions Fund (CSEF) close

If you have a valid means-tested concession card, such as a Veterans Affairs Gold Card, Centrelink Health Care Card, or Pensioner Concession Card, or are a temporary foster parent, you may be eligible.

Payment amounts this year are \$225 for eligible secondary school students. Payments are made direct to the school to use towards expenses relating to camps, excursions, and sporting activities for the benefit of your child.

If you applied for CSEF through our school last year, you do not need to complete an application form this year, unless there has been a change in your family circumstances.



# **NAPLAN Information**

# NAPLAN information for parents and carers

### Why do students do NAPLAN?

NAPLAN is a national literacy and numeracy assessment that students in Years 3, 5, 7 and 9 sit in May each year. It is the only national assessment all Australian students do.

As students progress through their school years, it's important to check how well they are learning the essential skills of reading, writing and numeracy.

NAPLAN assesses the literacy and numeracy skills that students are learning through the school curriculum and allows parents/carers to see how their child is progressing against national standards and over time.

NAPLAN is just one aspect of a school's assessment and reporting process. It doesn't replace ongoing assessments made by teachers about student performance, but it can provide teachers with additional information about students' progress.

NAPLAN also provides schools, education authorities and governments with information about how education programs are working and whether young Australians are achieving important educational outcomes in literacy and numeracy.

### Your child will do the NAPLAN tests online

Schools are transitioning from paper-based to computer-based assessments. Most schools will complete NAPLAN tests online in 2022. All Year 3 students will continue to complete the writing assessment on paper.

Online NAPLAN tests provide more precise results and are more engaging for students. One of the main benefits is tailored (or adaptive) testing, where the test presents questions which may be more or less difficult depending on a student's responses.

Tailored testing allows a wider range of student abilities to be assessed and measures student achievement more precisely. A student's overall NAPLAN result is based on both the number and complexity of questions they answer correctly. Your child should not be concerned if they find questions challenging; they may be taking a more complex test pathway.

### What does NAPLAN assess?

NAPLAN assesses literacy and numeracy skills that students are learning through their regular school curriculum.

Students sit assessments in writing, reading, conventions of language (spelling, grammar and punctuation) and numeracy. Questions assess content linked to the Australian Curriculum: English and Mathematics.

All government and non-government education authorities have contributed to the development of NAPLAN test materials.

### Participation in NAPLAN

NAPLAN is for everyone. ACARA supports inclusive testing so all students can participate in the national assessment program.

Adjustments are available for students with disability who have diverse functional abilities and needs.

Schools should work with parents/carers and students to identify, on a case-by-case basis, reasonable adjustments required for individual students with disability to access NAPLAN. Adjustments should reflect the support normally provided for classroom assessments.

To help inform these decisions, you may consult the NAPLAN public demonstration site, the Guide for schools to assist students with disability to access NAPLAN, or our series of videos where parents/carers, teachers and students share their experience of using NAPLAN adjustments.

In exceptional circumstances, a student with a disability that severely limits their capacity to participate in the assessment, or a student who has recently arrived in Australia and has a non-English speaking background, may be granted a formal exemption.

Your school principal and your local test administration authority can give you more information on adjustments for students with disability or the process required to gain a formal exemption.









# **NAPLAN Information**

# What if my child is absent from school on NAPLAN days?

Where possible, schools may arrange for individual students who are absent at the time of testing to complete missed tests at another time during the school's test schedule.

### What can I do to support my child?

Students are not expected to study for NAPLAN.

You can support your child by reassuring them that NAPLAN is a part of their school program and reminding them to simply do their best.

ACARA does not recommend excessive preparation for NAPLAN or the use of services by coaching providers.

Some familiarisation and explanation of NAPLAN is useful to help students understand and be comfortable with the format of the tests. Teachers will ensure students are familiar with the types of questions in the tests and will provide appropriate support and guidance.

### NAPLAN timetable

The NAPLAN online test window is nine days. This is to accommodate schools that may have fewer devices.

The NAPLAN online test window starts on Tuesday 10 May and finishes on Friday 20 May 2022. Tests must be scheduled as soon as possible within the testing window, prioritising the first week.

Online NAPLAN test scheduling requirements are detailed in the table below.

# How is my child's performance reported?

Individual student performance is shown on a national achievement scale for each assessment. A result at the national minimum standard indicates that the student has demonstrated the basic literacy and numeracy skills needed to participate fully in that year level.

A NAPLAN individual student report will be provided by your child's school later in the year. If you do not receive a report, you should contact your child's school.

### How are NAPLAN results used?

- Students and parents/carers may use individual results to discuss progress with teachers.
- Teachers use results to help identify students who need greater challenges or extra support.
- Schools use results to identify strengths and areas of need to improve teaching programs, and to set goals in literacy and numeracy.
- School systems use results to review programs and support offered to schools.
- The community can see information about the performance of schools over time at myschool.edu.au

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### HOLIDAY CAMP INFORMATION

### Which students are eligible for free holiday camps?

Students who meet one or more of the following criteria are eligible to attend a free holiday camp:

- attend a school that experienced closures of 5 days or more due to COVID-19 in 2021
- have an approved <u>Camps, Sports and Excursions Fund (CSEF)</u> application for 2022
- have a parent who holds a valid means-tested concession card (for example a Health Care Card, Job Seeker, Newstart Allowance, Disability Support Pension)
- are in out-of-home care (temporary or permanent)
- have a disability
- are from a refugee background \*
- are indigenous students
- · are in the Navigator program.

### When are the holiday camps?

The holiday camps will run in the 2022 school holidays — Term 1 (April), Term 2 (June/July) and Term 3 (September) 2022.

### How much does it cost?

These camps are completely free of charge to eligible families. It will not cost you anything for your child to attend the camp. Most of the camps can organise transport from central locations however, for some camps, parents may need to provide transport for their child. Specific information regarding transport will be supplied by the individual camp providers.

### How old does my child need to be?

Students in years 3 to 12 from the start of 2022 school year can attend holiday camp programs.

### Will my child get to go with their friends?

Your child may be able to go on camp with their friends if they book to go to the same camp and there are places available. However, please note that your child's friends may not be eligible for the Positive Start free holiday camp funding. Only eligible families may book through Positive Start. Remember, your child will also have the chance to make new friends and build relationships with students from other schools.

### What types of camps are there?

There will be a list of camps from which that you can choose. Each camp will have a brief description including where it is, the length of the camp (number of days), the dates it is running, how to get there; as well as a list of activities to help you decide which camp would best suit your child.

### What general safety measures are in place to ensure camps are safe for students?

Camp facilities and sites are reviewed each year and are accredited by an independent national accreditation scheme to ensure they meet best practice standards and that all students receive the best care. All camp activities are compliant with national safety standards. All staff members have working with children checks and undergo a thorough induction and checking process as part of working with the camp.





### What COVID Safe strategies are in place at camps?

All Positive Start in 2022 camps must put into place a Covid Safe plan that aligns with Department of Health and Department of Education and Training advice. This includes operating under up-to-date Covid Safe practices such as appropriate cleaning, activity design, food service and accommodation density and layouts.

### How do I register my interest?
