

### **Principal's Report**

### Welcome Back

Welcome back to all students, parents and staff after the two-week break. I hope and trust that everyone was able to have a bit of down time to recharge the batteries and have come back prepared



for Term 3. I would also like to make a special welcome back to our School for Student Leadership students, Acacia, Jade, Josie, Christopher and William, who spent the last 8 weeks of Term 2 at Don Valley. It does appear that they have transitioned well back into school, and we look forward to hearing about their time away and their Community Leadership Project that they will undertake later this year.

### Student Reports

Semester 1 student reports went live this week on Compass and if you have not done so already, I suggest sitting down with your child(ren) and reading through the reports. We have changed the format slightly which will hopefully make them easier to read, student specific and only one page per subject. Other student feedback is available through Compass if you would like information on specific Essential Learning Items. Staff mentors will make calls home over the next few weeks to not only ask how things are going, but to gain some feedback from families about the reports. If you have not, or cannot access Compass, please contact the College for a hard copy of the reports.

One area that I noted while reading the reports over the holidays was the number of students who were failing subjects due to poor attendance. It just makes clear sense that the higher the attendance rate, the better the educational outcomes. It also goes hand in hand that if students are missing a day a week (80% attendance) or 3 days a fortnight (70% attendance) or more than that, they just cannot be completing all the work that is expected of them at school. The minimum set by the Department is 80%, but we take individual circumstances into account if attendance rates are between 70 and 80% - especially if prior arrangements have been made.

It is vital that students are attending school every day that they can, as we are all aware that there may be times when attendance at school is not possible due to factors beyond our control. Individual attendance rates can be checked daily on the Compass app.

### **Buildings Update**

It was great to see the first major slab of our new build completed during the holiday break. This is the largest of a number of concrete pours for the new building and really gives the building some definition and shape. It was also really pleasing to hear how positively our Site Manager spoke of Jarryd Ezard and his crew and the professionalism and quality of work that has been done. We are lucky to have this expertise here in St. Arnaud.

### NAIDOC Week

NIADOC Week (National Aborigines and Islanders Day Observance Committee) celebrations were held across Australia in the first week of July to celebrate and recognise the history, culture, and achievements of Aboriginal and Torres Strait Islander peoples. It was very positive to see the way in which all our students approached the activities at school and the number of staff who have purchased NAIDOC week uniform to be worn at school.



### Yr. 11 Food Studies

This week in Year 11 Food Studies, the students made two dishes.

Jackson made Ragout. Ragout is a stew made from minced meat and vegetables cut into even-sized pieces, cooked in a thickened liquid that is flavoured with herbs and seasonings. Minced beef is a popular ingredient to use for everyday meals as it is inexpensive and very versatile. Jackson's knife skills are continuing to improve, and he was extremely efficient cutting up all the ingredients.





Anthony made a Mediterranean
Risotto. Although risotto is a classic
dish of northern Italy, it is now
considered to be part of the
repertoire of most contemporary
Australian cooks. This recipe also
uses arborio rice, a variety that
cooks to a plump, tender state and is
therefore perfect for making
risotto. This rice can absorb up to

four times its own volume, a valuable property in risotto- making. When arborio rice absorbs large quantities of stock, it provides a creamy consistency and delicious flavour.

Both boys, enjoyed the dishes and this was the first time that Jackson had eaten a risotto.





### Yr. 12 Biology



At the end of last Term, the Year 12 Biology students completed a science experiment on blood types using synthetic blood as part of their study of the immune system. Blood types are determined by the presence or absence of certain antigens – substances that can trigger an immune response if they are foreign to the body. Since some antigens can trigger a patient's immune system to attack the transfused blood, safe blood transfusions depend on careful blood-typing and cross-matching. There are four major blood groups determined by the presence or absence of two antigens—A and B - on the surface of red blood cells. In addition to the A and B antigens, there is a protein called the Rh factor, which can be either present (+) or absent (–), creating the 8 most common blood types (A+, A-, B+, B-, O+, O-, AB+, AB-).

### E-CIGARETTES & VAPING

WHAT WE NEED TO KNOW



While most people do not use e-cigarettes (also known as vapes), the number of young people who are using them (vaping) is increasing, and that's a concern for the health of our communities.

- There are no quality or safety standards for e-cigarettes so they could be made anywhere, by anyone and contain anything.
- Many vapes contain addictive nicotine, even the ones that say they don't. They just don't put it on the pack.
- Vapes contain the same toxic chemicals found in cleaning products, nail polish remover, weed killer and bug spray. These chemicals do not belong in our lungs.

### E-cigarettes / vaping and the law

- Smoking and vaping are banned in the grounds of, and within 4 metres of entrances to: childcare centres, kinders and schools.
- In Victoria it is illegal to sell e-cigarette devices or e-cigarette accessories containing nicotine.
- It is also illegal to sell e-cigarettes to, or buy e-cigarettes for, any person aged under 18 years.











### FOOD AND MOOD

THE LINK BETWEEN WHAT YOU EAT AND HOW YOU FEEL

### What we eat affects how our guts and brains work which can impact on our mental health.

Your brain is working hard 24/7 and requires a constant supply of fuel. That fuel comes directly from what we eat. Our gut and our brain talk to each other on what is known as the gut-brain axis. You might know this if you have ever experienced butterflies in your stomach when you're nervous.

Our diet can impact on our gut-microbiota, that is the bacteria in our guts, and can change the communication between the gut and the brain. Having more of the good kind of bacteria in your gut, from having a healthy well-balanced diet, sends good messages to the brain and can help in keeping your mood stable and reduce the symptoms of anxiety, depression and stress.

How to improve your diet to improve your mood:

Add more fruit, vegetables, whole grains, nuts and seeds to your diet

Reduce your intake of ultra-processed and discretionary foods

Consume more water daily, and make water your drink of choice
