


Year 8 Try the NCTTC Day


Parent Payment Arrangements and Options:

2023 Parent/Caregiver/Guardian Opinion Survey:

WE WANT OUR PARENTS / CAREGIVERS / GUARDIANS TO TELL US WHAT THEY THINK!

Our school is conducting a survey to find out what Parents/Caregivers/Guardians think of our school. The Parent/Caregiver/Guardian Opinion Survey is an annual survey offered by the Department of Education that is designed to assist schools in gaining an understanding of families' perceptions of school climate, student behavior, and student engagement. The survey is optional, but we encourage all families to participate. Our school will use the survey results to help inform and direct future school planning and improvement strategies.

A random sample of approximately 30 Parents/Caregivers/Guardians have been selected to participate in this year's survey.

The Parent / Caregiver / Guardian Opinion Survey will be open from Monday 7th August to Friday 8th September 2023.

The survey will be conducted **online**, only takes **20 minutes** to complete, and can be accessed at any convenient time within the survey period on desktop computers, laptops, tablets, or smartphones. The online survey will be available in English and 10 other languages including Arabic, Greek, Hakha Chin, Hindi, Japanese, Punjabi, Simplified Chinese, Somali, Turkish, and Vietnamese.

Yr. 10 Pre-Driver Education

Over two days this week (Tuesday 15th & Wednesday 16th August), Year 10 students participated in the Pre-Driver Education program at the Charlton Traffic Safety Education Centre.

This centre has a dedicated track where students can experience a wide range of traffic situations and conditions. There are parking spaces, traffic lights, different types of intersections, curves and bends, roundabouts, traffic signs and traffic lights, and even a hill. This all allows students to experience, explore and practice a wide range of driving techniques and skills. There were four cars and instructors, with half the students driving manual vehicles and the other half, automatic cars.

Over the two-day program, the Year 10 students learned about essential driving skills in both theory and in practice. This included the basics, such as starting up, moving off, steering and braking, left and right turns, lane and road position, accelerating and gear changes (for those in the manual cars), pulling over and shutting down the car. As the program continued, they advanced through more complex skills: angle parking, hill starts, parallel parking, 3-point turns, convoy driving, roundabout negotiation, cornering lines and overtaking. The final day finished with a night driving session, so that students could experience the challenges that darkness can bring and how to use their headlights for safe driving.

Students also experienced the effects of varied levels of intoxication through wearing different 'beer goggles', then trying to catch a ball and walk in a straight line. The program concluded with a documentary called 'Muck Up Day' which explored the real life and tragic consequences of poor driving attitudes.

Students learned that driving in real situations is much more complex than it appears. There were innumerable stalls of the manual cars – the record was 8! Some students also had difficulty keeping their car on the road, traffic cones were hit, stop signs were abused, roundabouts were confusing, but all participated with good humour in a supportive atmosphere. Better these mistakes happen on the practice track than on real roads!

Thank you to Ms. Brown for her organisation of the two days, and the teachers who accompanied

the group: Miss. Bertalli, Ms. Chapman, Mr. Hand and Dr. Taylor.

A particular thanks must go to the trainers: Hayley, Rebecca, Bryan, Stewart, Kim and Brett. They do important and valuable work to help our young people understand that driving is a privilege which they must approach with the right attitude.

Yr. 9 Broader Horizons — Agriculture








Last week we started our

Yr. 12 Food Studies







In Food this week, we made a pasta and cannellini bean soup, with green pockets to go with it. The soup is synonymous with Italian cuisine; the large white beans are popular in central and southern Italy. The variety of

vegetables used in the soup and the additional beans provide a wide range of nutrients including vitamins, minerals and dietary fibre, as well as having the added advantage of being low in kilojoules. Green pockets are a great snack food that are similar to gozleme, but have a thicker softer dough. The acid in the yogurt and vinegar tenderise



the dough by disrupting the formation of the gluten network during kneading, so the final product is soft and fluffy on the inside.

In theory, students have just finished food security and ensuring that all ingredients are readily accessible and affordable to everyone. We will be starting on sustainable primary food production and risks to environmental stability.

DIY Science – Sunny Surviva

Use the Sun to distil water and measure the time until sunset and use the stars to navigate

Two clean and clear glass or plastic drink bottles of the same size (no lids), table salt teaspoon, tape, natural materials (dirt, rocks, leaves), fruit juice

When doing science activities outdoors, wear sun protection and comfortable, closed-in shoes. Always treat the natural environment with care and try to leave it as you found it.

Add 1 teaspoon of salt to the water and swirl the bottle to dissolve the salt

until it is about 1/4 full.

tight seal. Be careful to make sure none of the salty water goes into the empty bottle. Find a sunny location and use dirt or rocks to create a low mound.

The approximate time until sunset is 15 minutes multiplied by the number of finger widths. For example, if the Sun is 4 finger widths above the horizon, the Sun will set in approximately 15 minutes x 4 = 1 hour. This is based on an adult hand and works best in locations that are close to the Equator where the Sun moves straight down towards the horizon. For locations with bend wrist and fingers held horizontally. Line up the little finger with the horizon, or the point where the sky meets the land, and count the number of finger-widths between the land and the setting Sun. If four fingers are not enough, stack the other hand on top of the first. closer to the Poles, sunset will take longer because the Sun's path is at an angle to the

What's happening?

water. The salt does not evaporate, so it stays in the first bottle, and the condensed water in the empty bottle is salt-free and purified. If you were using this method to survive, you might need a few more bottles to purify enough water to drink! Distillation is a way of purifying water using heat. Light from the Sun warms up the salty water and causes some of the water to evaporate, forming invisible water vapour, which is a type of gas. The water vapour spreads throughout the two bottles. When some of the water vapour in the empty bottle cools down in the shade, it condenses, and turns back into liquid

moving as it spins on its axis, doing one complete revolution every 24 hours. It takes one year for Earth to orbit the Sun. The path of the Sun across the sky depends on the location on Earth but the Sun always travels at the same speed across the sky. This is measured as an angle, with the Sun moving 15° across the sky every hour. During the day, the Sun appears to move across the sky, but it is really planet Earth that is







E-CIGARETTES & VAPING

WHAT WE NEED TO KNOW

While most people do not use e-cigarettes (also known as vapes), the number of young people who are using them (vaping) is increasing, and that's a concern for the health of our communities.

- There are no quality or safety standards for e-cigarettes so they could be made anywhere, by anyone and contain anything.
- Many vapes contain addictive nicotine, even the ones that say they don't. They just don't put it on the pack.
- Vapes contain the same toxic chemicals found in cleaning products, nail polish remover, weed killer and bug spray. These chemicals do not belong in our lungs.

E-cigarettes / vaping and the law

- Smoking and vaping are banned in the grounds of, and within 4 metres of entrances to: childcare centres, kinders and schools.
- In Victoria it is illegal to sell e-cigarette devices or e-cigarette accessories containing nicotine.
- It is also illegal to sell e-cigarettes to, or buy e-cigarettes for, any person aged under 18 years.


