


R U OK Day?

Sun Smart Hats




SHADE & SUN SMART GRANT & PARENTS CLUB DONATION

Yr. 9 Enviro Week

Enviro Week was an exciting and educational experience for the Year 9 students at our school. The week-long event aimed to raise awareness about environmental issues and promote sustainable practices among the students. Throughout the week, the students engaged in various activities that allowed them to learn about ecosystems, biodiversity, water quality, and wildlife conservation.

On Monday and Tuesday, the students embarked on a camping trip to the Goode's, who live on local conservation land. Guided by representatives from Landcare and Trust for Nature, the students learned about the importance of reforestation and its impact on ecosystems. They actively participated in planting trees and native ground cover, which not only helped to restore the natural habitat but also contributed to offsetting carbon emissions.

During their time at the Goode's, the students also had the opportunity to learn about ecosystems and the significance of biodiversity. Volunteers from Landcare and Trust for Nature provided informative sessions, highlighting the interdependence of different species within an ecosystem. The students gained a deeper understanding of how each organism plays a crucial role in maintaining a balanced and healthy environment. Furthermore, fauna and flora surveys were conducted during the camping trip. The students were taught how to identify different species of plants and animals, with a particular focus on threatened frogs. They discovered several threatened frog species in their surroundings, which further emphasised the importance of conserving these delicate creatures. In addition to terrestrial ecosystems, water ecosystems were also explored during Enviro Week.

On Wednesday, the students completed water quality tests in a nearby dam ecosystem. They learned about the factors that affect water quality and how it impacts aquatic life. This hands-on experience allowed them to understand the significance of preserving clean water sources for both human and animal populations. On the Thursday was an exciting day as the students visited Andrew Borg's wildlife rehabilitation site. Here, they had the opportunity to witness a range of threatened and endangered animals up close. The visit provided valuable insights into the challenges faced by these species and the efforts being made to protect and rehabilitate them. The students were inspired by the dedication of Andrew Borg and his team in preserving wildlife.

To conclude the week, Friday was designated as rewards day. The students had a great time at the Zone, for some roller-skating and laser tag. This day served as a reward for their active participation and engagement throughout Enviro Week.

Overall, Enviro Week was a resounding success, providing the Year 9 students with a comprehensive understanding of environmental issues and the importance of conservation. Through hands-on activities, educational sessions, and visits to relevant sites, the students gained practical knowledge and developed a sense of responsibility towards the environment. Big thanks to Andrew Borg for Landcare, Trust for Nature and Miss Brown and Miss Goode for organising everything.

Thomas Amos completed VCE at St.
Arnaud Secondary College in 2017,
studying English, General Maths, History
Revolutions and Legal Studies. He was
accepted into a Bachelor of Arts at
Latrobe University Bendigo in 2018.
While this was not Thomas's first choice,
he worked extremely hard in his first
year and achieved the marks to enable
him to transfer to a Bachelor of
Law/Bachelor of Arts course in 2019.


Since then, Thomas has been working extremely hard in both courses. His achievements have included participating in a history based online internationalisation module with Sheffield Hallum University (UK). This module covered mining and migration between South Yorkshire and Victoria in the 19th Century. Thomas discovered that a distant relative on his grandmother's side (Jan Amos), who came to St. Arnaud in the Victorian Gold Rush, was from

South Yorkshire. Thomas' work was featured in promotional material promoting the module in Australia and the UK. Thomas has an article on his Great Great Grandfather's Second World War experience as a Japanese Prisoner of War in an upcoming LaTrobe eBureau book.

On the legal side of his studies, Thomas was awarded the Howard Nathan Law School Bursary in 2021. He was also awarded the 2022 Latrobe Law School Dean Prize for receiving the highest mark in LCR3CYC – Cybercrime subject. Thomas graduated with a Bachelor of Laws (Honours)/Bachelor of Arts in July 2023. He is currently employed as Peer Learning Advisor at Latrobe University Library and will resume his studies in 2024, completing a History Honours.


Both teams will have 8 riders and 1 pit crew member, with an even split of males and females.



VAPING - GET THE FACTS

Vapes have appealing flavours and packaging designed to suck you in. But do you know what you are sucking in?

Vapes contain 100s of chemicals, some of which are found in nail polish remover, weed killer, bug spray and disinfectants. They also contain nicotine and heavy metals such as nickel, tin and lead! Whilst these chemicals are great for their intended purpose, they don't belong anywhere near our mouths and are horrible for our lungs and general health.

Vapes can and have exploded and caught fire, with the most common area from related burns injuries occurring on the face and around the genitals (when vapes are kept in pockets).



Even if it doesn't feel like it, stopping vaping is possible and you don't have to do it alone.

E-CIGARETTES & VAPING

WHAT WE NEED TO KNOW

While most people do not use e-cigarettes (also known as vapes), the number of young people who are using them (vaping) is increasing, and that's a concern for the health of our communities.

- There are no quality or safety standards for e-cigarettes so they could be made anywhere, by anyone and contain anything.
- Many vapes contain addictive nicotine, even the ones that say they don't. They just don't put it on the pack.
- Vapes contain the same toxic chemicals found in cleaning products, nail polish remover, weed killer and bug spray. These chemicals do not belong in our lungs.

E-cigarettes / vaping and the law

- Smoking and vaping are banned in the grounds of, and within 4 metres of entrances to: childcare centres, kinders and schools.
- In Victoria it is illegal to sell e-cigarette devices or e-cigarette accessories containing nicotine.
- It is also illegal to sell e-cigarettes to, or buy e-cigarettes for, any person aged under 18 years.


