The Year 12 students were given a range of breakfast type

foods and they had to say what they would like to have cooked for them. The decision was made that Jackson and Anthony would cook banana and honey breakfast loaves, savoury breakfast scones, egg and bacon

Yr. 12 Food Studies







On Tuesday, 29th August, in our Food Studies lesson, which only consisted of one student, we decided to try something different. While I (Mrs. Reynolds), made the lemon custard filling, Rogan made the doughnut mixture and cooked this in the piemaker to make our doughnuts.

Once the doughnuts were cooked and slightly cooled, we piped the custard into the centre. In theory, students finished their theory component by looking at the food processing and transportation requirements of our food, what food miles were and how can we make these processes sustainable into the future.



Yr. 7-8 Science



In Science this week the students had the opportunity to look at a range of leaves to see if they contained the same pigments. Producers, such as plants and algae, are green due to a pigment called chlorophyll. Leaves in plants also contain other pigments, such as carotenes and xanthophylls.

In the investigation, the pigments of various plants were extracted by soaking them in methylated spirits and separated by using chromatography. The pigments which are similar to each of the leaves were identified. This was completed in the ecosystem section where we looked at how plants and animals work together in food chains and webs to allow the biodiversity that we have.



Yr. 12 Food Studies - 5/9/23



In food last week, with both students back in class, we made middle eastern chicken, which was marinated in a mixture of spices and pan fired. This recipe is high in protein and very low in fat. The ginger cake was made into muffins due to time constraints in allowing time to cool the cake and for it to be iced. The muffins were very light and moist, with the use of fresh ginger as the main flavour. Oil was used instead of butter so that it contained monounsaturated fat rather than saturated fat, making it a better choice for good health.

In theory, students continued with their research project based around ethics, risk, processing, and transportation requirements and how can they be sustainable. Students have created a question they want to answer.

Outdoor Environmental Studies

On Sunday 3rd September, we headed off to Anglesea as a part of our School Assessed Coursework (SAC). We arrived late afternoon, set up our swags and headed to the beach for some fishing. Unfortunately, we did not catch anything and had to go hungry for the night!

Monday $4^{\rm th}$ September, the students went for a ride around the park where



we were staying, enjoyed bacon and eggs for breakfast and then got themselves ready for a morning of surfing. All students mastered the art of

surfing with some students picking it up quicker than others. They had the help of Mr. Magowan along with surfing instructors.

Unfortunately, Mr. Magowan aggravated a recurring hamstring injury while surfing and could not take the students on a mountain bike ride in the afternoon

We did a driving tour of Anglesea to look at the health of the environment and how the residents are rebuilding on existing blocks as the town is landlocked by the Otway National Park. We looked at the sustainability of the area for individual and society use now and for the future.

We headed back to St. Arnaud late Monday afternoon with a stop in Ballarat for KFC. The students will use the experiences from this camp to complete their final journal SAC looking at two sections. The first is about the need for a healthy outdoor environment for individual and society use and wellbeing, also for the continual use in the future.



The second component is how the Flora and Fauna Act helps to maintain or improve the current situation so that it is there for future users.

On Wednesday 13th September, the senior WRS students piled onto the bus for a long trip up to the other side of Birchip to attend the BCG Main Field Day.

The field day is an opportunity for farmers to view and discuss some of the latest research and development in agricultural technology and methodology. The BCG has now opened the event up to students so that they can gain an insight into some of the behind-the-scenes aspects of the industry.

The day also allows students to learn about some of the diverse jobs and careers in agriculture.

St. Arnaud students enjoyed the day in the warm weather and discovered many fascinating developments in the cropping sector. The first workshop was all about the different types of weed sprays available to farmers at different prices points.

The scientists from BCG test the different chemicals in various conditions so that they can help farmers work out the best value for money solutions for their farm.

Next, the students were offered an insight into the robotics and artificial intelligence developments in weed eradication. Terminator-like programs running on boom sprays using hi-tech cameras to hunt weeds was a great preview of the future.

Finally, students attended a seminar where scientists and agribusiness representatives discussed their own pathways into the industry and offered advice to students looking to enter agriculture.

A fine feed was laid on by the LLEN, with a massive selection of delectable delights to choose from. After lunch we headed all the way back to St. Arnaud.


L2P Program










The Robe of skulls





DO YOU KNOW WHAT YOU ARE VAPING?

VAPING - GET THE FACTS

Vapes have appealing flavours and packaging designed to suck you in. But do you know what you are sucking in?

Vapes contain 100s of chemicals, some of which are found in nail polish remover, weed killer, bug spray and disinfectants. They also contain nicotine and heavy metals such as nickel, tin and lead! Whilst these chemicals are great for their intended purpose, they don't belong anywhere near our mouths and are horrible for our lungs and general health.

Vapes can and have exploded and caught fire, with the most common area from related burns injuries occurring on the face and around the genitals (when vapes are kept in pockets).



Even if it doesn't feel like it, stopping vaping is possible and you don't have to do it alone.

E-CIGARETTES & VAPING

WHAT WE NEED TO KNOW

While most people do not use e-cigarettes (also known as vapes), the number of young people who are using them (vaping) is increasing, and that's a concern for the health of our communities.

- There are no quality or safety standards for e-cigarettes so they could be made anywhere, by anyone and contain anything.
- Many vapes contain addictive nicotine, even the ones that say they don't. They just don't put it on the pack.
- Vapes contain the same toxic chemicals found in cleaning products, nail polish remover, weed killer and bug spray. These chemicals do not belong in our lungs.

E-cigarettes / vaping and the law

- Smoking and vaping are banned in the grounds of, and within 4 metres of entrances to: childcare centres, kinders and schools.
- In Victoria it is illegal to sell e-cigarette devices or e-cigarette accessories containing nicotine.
- It is also illegal to sell e-cigarettes to, or buy e-cigarettes for, any person aged under 18 years.




