Now all they need is a band name – any suggestions should be passed onto band-members or Mrs Walsh.







Victorian State School Spectacular (VSSS)



Another fabulous year of VSSS for our St Arnaud Secondary College students! After a two-year enforced absence due to Covid, VSSS was back on the stage! This year we took 3 lucky students down to Melbourne: Maya Feeny, Amelia Kirkpatrick-Harris and Mara Reynolds. They had a wonderful time dancing in front of an audience of 6000 in John Cain Arena next door to the MCG and Rod Laver Arena. Two shows were performed at 1pm and 6:30pm.

Leaving on Wednesday 7th September, we spent two very full days rehearsing in the Arena with 80 other Government schools. During this time, the students worked with choreographers who organised each school group into their positions in a giant jigsaw on the dance floor. It was amazing to see on concert day how the whole production come together, and the mass dancers moved as one co-ordinated group of 1200 dancers. Fantastic sequinned, reversible jackets were provided as costumes for all the dancers.

The choir consisted of 750 students and the 50-piece orchestra! Once again, all students were unbelievably talented. Creative Director, Neill Gladwin, is well known as a member of the comedy duo Los Trios Ringbarkus. Choreographer, Deon Nuku, has performed in West Side Story, Footloose, Fame, performed with Macy Gray and Kylie Minogue, amongst many other credits. Hara, our dance teacher from the Performing Dance Unit, travelled to Ballarat three times to put our dancers through their paces. VSSS provides our students with the unique opportunity of working with people of this calibre.

The Performing Arts Unit is an arm of the State Government and they make it all come to life. The lighting, staging and production are of the same quality or better than many touring artists. The VSSS has become a vehicle for many talented students to kick start their singing careers, others are spotted by dance academies and offered scholarships.

VCE Extended Investigation

VCE Extended Investigation 2022

2022 has seen the first year of VCE Extended Investigation being studied at St Arnaud Secondary College. Two students – Ronan James and Berenice Walsh – have taken on the subject as an opportunity to explore a topic of personal interest.

Extended Investigation provides students with an opportunity to develop a piece of rigorous research on a topic of their own choosing. A key feature of this study is the students' use of critical thinking to examine and explore complex and often challenging concepts and ideas.

During Unit 3 (Semester 1), students submitted and were assessed on the development and justification of their question, their written research proposal and an oral progress report about their project. They also completed a state-wide Critical Thinking Test in late July.

Students submitted their final, 4,000-word reports on Friday 9th September for external assessment by VCAA. At the start of Term 4, both students will complete an oral presentation and defence of research as their final externally assessed item.

Ronan James - How adolescents view horror films.

Ronan has spent this year exploring how people watch horror films. He first researched the reasons that people watch horror, using the work of Mattias Clasen to explain that viewers use this genre to unknowingly improve their fear-response (training their amygdala), among other theories. These viewing practices were also set within the context of the rise in streaming services and the increasing popularity of this 'scary genre'. He used a phenomenological research methodology, which primarily focused on the use of interviews as the central method. He asked his participants to watch a selected film, then interviewed them about their experiences. His interviews focused



on exploring how the participants viewed the film, exploring environmental, behavioural and personality factors that influenced their experience. By comparing the behaviour and reactions of an adult viewer to an adolescent, he was able to move towards confirming Clasen's hypothesis. As a case-study, this research provided a discrete window into the lived experience of horror viewers, revealing practices that may generate potential for future research.


Berenice Walsh - Rural access to dialysis treatment during the COVID-19 pandemic.

Berrie has investigated how rural access to dialysis treatment services have been affected during the recent (and ongoing) COVID-19 pandemic. She justified her topic through exploring research about different types of dialysis, rural disadvantage in accessing health services and the impact of COVID-19 on the provision of medical services. She used a mixed-method approach, which included examining 'grey literature' (government papers), distribution data and interviewing stakeholders as her primary data set (a dialysis nurse and a patient). Whilst not generalisable, Berrie's investigation was able to confirm the findings of prior research in the experiences of




her two participants, though noted that the impact of the COVID-19 pandemic was more pronounced for her nurse participant than the patient. Despite its narrow scope, this investigation provides an example of how case-studies can be usefully used to explore the lived experience of larger-scale investigations and lay the groundwork for future research into the experiences of specific cohorts of rural patients.

This week in Year 11 Food Studies, the students cooked chicken with sundried tomato marinade served on couscous.






Jesse Amos is using the Vernier Data Logger (provided by Parents club) to determine the pH at which synthetic and natural indicators change colour or when the end point of a reaction can be determined, and in this case, of an acid base reaction.

The digital data logger collects the information and Jesse downloaded the information into Excel.



Chemistry students then produced useful graphs to analyse and make sensible conclusions about the indicators.





Parent Payment information has been mailed to families – please contact the school if you require any further details.

The Department of Education and Training has sought to clarify the Parent Payments Policy for 2022. Schools can request contributions from parents under three categories.

- Curriculum Contributions contributions for curriculum items and activities which the school deems necessary for students to learn the Curriculum e.g., textbook use, consumable materials, paper
- Other Contributions Voluntary financial contributions for non-curriculum items and activities that relate to the school's functions and objectives e.g., school building enhancements
- Extra-Curricular Items and Activities Items and activities that enhance or broaden the schooling experience of students and are above and beyond what the school provides for free to deliver the Curriculum. These are provided on a user-pays basis. e.g., Optional Year level camps

Camps, Sports and Excursions Fund applications

The Camps, Sports and Excursions Fund helps eligible families to cover the costs of school trips, camps, and sporting activities. Applications for the Camps, Sports, and Excursions Fund (CSEF) close 24/06/2022

If you have a valid means-tested concession card, such as a Veterans Affairs Gold Card, Centrelink Health Care Card, or Pensioner Concession Card, or are a temporary foster parent, you may be eligible.

Payment amounts this year are \$225 for eligible secondary school students. Payments are made direct to the school to use towards expenses relating to camps, excursions, and sporting activities for the benefit of your child.

If you applied for CSEF through our school last year, you do not need to complete an application form this year, unless there has been a change in your family circumstances.




