

Principal's Report

Building works

Well, the day has finally arrived. After months and months of negotiations, replanning, cutting back plans, getting additional funding, our building works are underway. Wednesday was an exciting day, with all the temporary fencing being installed, providing a very clear picture of the scope and extent of the first



phase of the works. As we have known all along, this will create some disruption to foot traffic flow around the school, but nothing that will have any significant impact. The first phase of the works will see the old science wing, three portables and the change-rooms all demolished, and the construction of the centrepiece of the works: a new state of the art main wing which will house all year levels, the staff workroom, student management centre, the kitchen, and new toilets and changerooms. It is the most significant piece of work and will have a massive impact on how we operate as a school. We expect there will be some teething issues, but all current classes have been operating without any of these buildings in use. This first phase is expected to be fully completed and handed back to the school by April 25, 2024. As we have said – it is short term pain for long term gain. We will keep you posted.

Year 7 Camp

The Year 7's have been on camp this week and have been having an action-packed time. They have spent time at Kryal Castle and at Sovereign Hill outside of the time they are doing activities at the Log Cabin Camp. The first couple of days were hectic, but things appear to have settled down by day three. We look forward to hearing about their adventures when they get back to school.


Year 7 and 9 NAPLAN

In a little over a week, our Year 7 and 9 students will be undertaking the National Assessment Program – Literacy and Numeracy (or NAPLAN). This testing is conducted annually in Years 3, 5, 7 and 9, and allows students, families, and schools to track student progress and identify areas of support. This is one of a range of tests that all schools conduct and, while it is clearly important, it is one test on one day and the results should be viewed in conjunction with other assessments. This year's testing is all being done online, and students have been both practicing and ironing out any possible tech issues. All we ask of our students is that try to do their best on each of the tests that are provided to them.

CSEF Financial Assistance

FINANCIAL ASSISTANCE INFORMATION FOR PARENTS

Every Victorian child should have access to the world of learning opportunities that exist beyond the classroom. The Camps, Sports and Excursions Fund helps ensure that no student will miss out on the opportunity to join their classmates for important, educational and fun activities. It is part of making Victoria the Education State and the Government's commitment to breaking the link between a student's background and their outcomes.

CAMPS, SPORTS & EXCURSIONS FUND (CSEF)

School camps provide children with inspiring experiences in the great outdoors. Excursions encourage a deeper understanding of how the world works while sports teach teamwork, discipline and leadership. All are a part of a healthy curriculum.

CSEF is provided by the Victorian Government to assist eligible families to cover the costs of school trips, camps and sporting activities.

If you hold a valid means-tested concession card or are a temporary foster parent, you may be eligible for CSEF. A special consideration category also exists for asylum seeker and refugee families. The allowance is paid to the school to use towards expenses relating to camps, excursions or sporting activities for the benefit of your child.

The annual CSEF amount per student is:

- · \$125 for primary school students
- · \$225 for secondary school students

HOW TO APPLY

New applicants should contact the school office to obtain a CSEF application form or download from the website below.

If you applied for CSEF at your child's school last year, you do not need to complete an application form this year unless there has been a change in your family circumstances.

You only need to complete an application form if any of the following changes have occurred:

- new student enrolments; your child has started or changed schools this year.
- changed family circumstances; such as a change of custody, change of name, concession card number, or new siblings commencing this year.

Check with the school office if you are unsure.

At this stage, we are looking for expressions of interest to assist with planning. 




and as a study site. After a well-deserved ice-cream at the end of the walk, we joined the Year 12's on the short walk to Heatherlie Quarry.






Term 1 of Science has started strong with two very different topics in our Year 9 and 10 classes.

Humanities Classes


Humanities

With being halfway through the term, most students in all levels of Humanities will be close to completing or have already completed their first assessment. The Year 7s are working on history terminology, archaeology, and prehistoric/archaic civilizations. We have just finished a study of the newest archaeological discoveries at Stonehenge, where it's been revealed that the famous stone circle was in fact moved from its original location in Wales. The students are learning about archaic



civilizations from all over the world, and their first assessment task is to research a very old civilization and present their findings to the class.

In the 7-8 Humanities class, the Year 7s are currently studying ancient civilisations and working on an Ancient Civilisation design using Minecraft. It's an Essential Learning Item. This semester the Year 8s are studying Medieval History and have been studying medieval European and Japanese castles. They are enthusiastically working on their own medieval castle using Minecraft. It's also an Essential Learning Item.



The Year 8s have completed a short unit on the Vikings. For their assessment, they have completed an annotated graphic display on the life of Vikings. We have moved on to studying the Middle Ages. They experienced a taste of peasants' pottage last week and we have an ongoing role-play with King Declan, son of William the first, in our kingdom, in charge. He has been ably supported by Cardinal Max, Lord Austin, and Lord Hamish. Our knights,

Sir Ollie, and Sir Jack are hoping to see some battle action, particularly after Sir Jarayne was caught in a treasonous conspiracy last week and paid a huge price for undermining the King. Now students are working on a three-day diary based on the life of a peasant.

In Year 9, the topic is The Industrial Revolution. Students have finished watching two documentaries highlighting the key elements to the Industrial Revolution and why it occurred in Britain. Their job now is to write a recommendation as to which documentary should be retained for future Yr. 9 students. This report should be either already submitted or due for submission early next week.

Humanities continued





The Year 10 class has started with Geography this semester and they have been looking at changing and managing the environment. Their first assessment task was an annotated graphic display on an endangered species within Australia. This was to be completed and submitted this week.

The Year 11 History class has been looking at the Cold War and have completed several classroom activities. They have been looking at analysing political cartoons and drawing on different historical interpretations. They are about to look at how the arms race, space race and Olympic Games all contributed to the Cold War tensions.

The Year 12 Legal Studies class have a little more course work to complete before they attempt their first SAC. They are currently looking closely at the Criminal Justice system. We have two students from Donald in our class and we are hoping to go to Donald for a face-to-face class on Friday.







Camps, Sports, and Excursions Fund applications

The Camps, Sports and Excursions Fund helps eligible families to cover the costs of school trips, camps, and sporting activities. Applications for the Camps, Sports, and Excursions Fund (CSEF) close 23/06/2023

If you have a valid means-tested concession card, such as a Veterans Affairs Gold Card, Centrelink Health Care Card, or Pensioner Concession Card, or are a temporary foster parent, you may be eligible.

Payment amounts this year are \$225 for eligible secondary school students. Payments are made direct to the school to use towards expenses relating to camps, excursions, and sporting activities for the benefit of your child.

If you applied for CSEF through our school last year, you do not need to complete an application form this year, unless there has been a change in your family circumstances.

FREE INSTRUCTION

- Schools provide students with free instruction and ensure students have free access to all items, activities and services that are used by the school to fulfil the standard curriculum requirements in Victorian Curriculum F-10, VCE and VCAL.
- Schools may invite parents to make a financial contribution to support the school.

PARENT PAYMENT REQUESTS

Schools can request contributions from parents under three categories:

Curriculum Contributions


Voluntary financial the school deems necessary for students to learn the Curriculum.

Other Contributions

Voluntary financial contributions for curriculum contributions for nonitems and activities which curriculum items and activities that relate to the school's functions and objectives.

Extra-Curricular Items and Activities

Items and activities that enhance or broaden the schooling experience of students and are above and beyond what the school provides for free to deliver the Curriculum. These are provided on a user-pays basis.





FINANCIAL HELP FOR FAMILIES

- Schools put in place financial hardship arrangements to support families who cannot pay for items or activities so that their child doesn't miss out.
- Schools have a nominated parent payment contact person(s) that parents can have a confidential discussion with regarding financial hardship arrangements.



SCHOOL PROCESSES

Schools must obtain school council approval for their parent payment arrangements and publish all requests and communications for each year level on their school website for transparency.



St Arnaud Secondary College Bring Your Own Device Program (BYOD) 2023

Students studying at St Arnaud Secondary College in 2023 are invited to supply their own notebook device for use as part of the College's BYOD (Bring Your Own Device) program. This document provides details of the BYOD program and device recommendations. For further details see the College's website – BYOD Program 2023 https://www.starnaudsc.vic.edu.au/

What type of BYOD do students need?

The device must be capable of connecting to the College's 5GHz Wi-Fi network, so it must support 802.11a or 802.11ac Wi-Fi connections. The device should be appropriate to work on and produce office style documents such as spreadsheets, word processed documents and presentations which may need to be printed or submitted electronically.

A table of recommended device specifications can be found in the BYOD Recommendations Guide. Ideally students should obtain a BYOD device which meets with the specification in the "Great" or "Acceptable" section of the table. The table is intended as a guide, where devices with some variation from the specifications listed may be suitable.

Do participating students require a new device?

Participating students are not required to purchase a new device. Students may already have a device that will be suitable. Use the BYOD Recommendations Guide to compare the device's suitability.

If students do prefer to use a new device, where should they purchase it from?

You are not required to purchase a device from any particular supplier. However, to assist you with the choice of device, you can purchase from Learning with Technology (LWT), and a link is provided for you to view the devices listed on the LWT portal for comparison of device offerings from other suppliers also.

The 3 Must-have Enterprise Skills for School Leavers



There's a huge range of skills that students need (enterprise skills comprise more than 25 distinct skill sets like leadership, negotiation, etc.), but if students have these 3 enterprise skills, they'll have the ability to take advantage of opportunities that present themselves in the world of work:

Interpersonal skills

Employers need to have employees that they can converse with about tasks, and young entrepreneurs/self-employed people need to be able to work with a wide range of people, from suppliers to contractors to customers.

Adding to this, we also need collaboration skills – another key enterprise trait, as our ability to work together is critical to us as a society. If you can relate to people, converse well with people, and collaborate with people, you'll easily stand out from a wide field of candidates.

Problem solving

Ask almost any employer and they'll tell you that they're far more likely to employ someone who can quickly learn how to do something, or solve a problem fast, over someone who has 'experience'. This is especially so in the technology industries — as rapid solutions to problems (which this skill focuses on) is becoming far more valuable than tenure or degrees. Problem solving as a skill also ties in the need for creativity and critical thinking, both of which can make an individual highly valuable to an employer.

Time management

The ability for a young person to self-manage might seem like a minor thing, but in a workplace where tasks or projects need to be done to meet a schedule, it will very quickly show up as being a major problem. It starts in school with getting ready on time in the mornings, and doing homework/assignments on time, but in the world of work it means deadlines that can cost a business a significant amount of money or missed opportunity if things aren't done when they should be. So, while this might seem like the simplest of the 3 enterprise skills, being able to manage how and when tasks get done is the foundation of everything else.
